- Scale Trust Circles and Common Table Projects to all states.
- Host the first Belonging Festivals in every region.

Years 4–5

- Embed Civic Listening Forums into local governance, schools, and public institutions.
- Establish the Common Good Service Corps as a permanent part of national service.

Accountability & Measures

- **Trust Index:** Annual surveys measuring trust in neighbors and institutions.
- **Participation Rates:** # of citizens attending forums, service projects, or reconciliation programs.
- **Diversity & Reach:** Representation across race, class, region, and ideology.
- **Conflict Resolution:** Documented cases of community disputes resolved through trust programs.
- **Civic Engagement:** Voter participation, volunteerism, and civic literacy improvements.

Historical Reference & Value

Periods of distrust and division have always tested America. In the aftermath of the Civil War, Reconstruction attempted to knit the country back together, but unresolved racial wounds left scars that persist. The Great Depression gave rise to civic projects that brought neighbors together in service and labor, while the civil rights movement of the 1960s showed the power of community organizing to challenge injustice and reclaim belonging. After September 11, 2001, a brief resurgence of unity showed that Americans can come together across difference —

but polarization soon deepened again. These moments prove that trust and belonging are not automatic; they must be cultivated. The Belonging & Civic Trust Beacon draws from these lessons, establishing reconciliation, listening, and civic rituals as permanent features of the democratic fabric.
